2007-08 Accomplishments:

Career Services has met with the Cooperative Education Advisory Board, Claudia Smith from the Office of International Education, Jim Uhlir from Health and Safety, and Chris Smith from Outreach Services to determine the process of international co-op site approval and risk management and to determine the content for the **International Co-op Guidelines for students.** The Cooperative Education Advisory Board has also drafted a **checklist** (**in process of revision**) of the different steps that need to be completed by the students as well as the different UW-Stout offices involved, prior to a student registering for an International Co-op.

The Co-op Advisory Board Committee has met a number of times to discuss approaches to leveraging the \$12,500 to maximize the number of International Co-op work sites. Some of this money was utilized this year by faculty traveling to UK, Ireland, Germany, and Finland to develop potential co-op sites internationally. We also had 6 students participate in International Co-ops in 2007-2008 in the countries of:
